One lesson governments have learned is that creating a nice-looking, easy-to-use app is not enough. These apps must seamlessly integrate into the agency's back-end systems. Many agencies that are interested in mobility struggle with where to start and how to bridge the gap between where they are and where they are going.

One of the difficulties of doing this is finding a way to map the offense or charge codes from all of the diverse applications when few, if any, of them use the same classification or structure for storing those offenses in their data systems. A master charge code service that is available to, and used by all justice agencies and systems may be the intermediary needed to make this difficult process of mapping disparate systems possible. This session will discuss the efforts made in a couple of states along with some lessons learned and some ideas of how to get started.</p>	<p><b>Session 5 - SAVIN IEPD - MT Pilot - John Daugherty, Chief Information Officer - Administrator, Montana Department of Corrections; Joan Eliel, Program Specialist, Montana Dept. of Justice, Office of Consumer Protection and Victim Services</b> In 2010, the Bureau of Justice Assistance sought project proposals for the purpose of creating a national standard that states could use to share relevant offender information with victims and entities throughout the criminal justice system. The focus of the project is to develop a SAVIN information exchange standard (IEPD, or Information Exchange Package Documentation), based on the National Information Exchange Model (NIEM) to automate and improve the sharing of offender data across systems. Montana was selected as the pilot site. This session will discuss the development of the IEPD and implementation phases from key technologist and business practice management on the project.</p>

In Hampden County, MA, the sheriff has created a portal for treatment providers to access appropriate offender data. This session will demonstrate the portal and explain its benefits to treatment providers.</p>	<p><b>Session 9 - eFiling Solutions That Work - Criminal and Civil</b> - Harry Giordano, Special Projects Manager JNET; Eric Radnovich, Director of Forensic Services, Cumberland County District Attorney's Office eFiling provides a method for various agencies to electronically submit criminal complaints and citation information to the Court.
