		Session 3: Is It Time to Replace Your Existing Pretrial Assessment Tool? Tara Blair, Chief Operating Officer, Kentucky Admin Office of the Courts. In this session, we will explore the recent meta-analysis of pretrial risk assessments conducted by the Laura and John Arnold Foundation which challenges the most common approach taken by pretrial risk and other assessment. However, outside of the courtroom, making evidence-based management and policy decisions is not always the norm. Part of this comes from a lack of access to valid data; another challenge is finding tools to analyze the data once you get it.
