The OPISIS program evolved as an informal effort to address the patchwork and dysfunctional criminal justice information system. The informal governance and project management approach led to early successes and accelerated (and accelerating) change, but these results have created strains on personnel and resources. The challenge now is to build a stable and permanent ICJIS without losing momentum, and without threatening the voluntary cooperative relationships that have been critical to progress.</p>

N-DEX detects relationships between people vehicles/property, location, and/or crime characteristics. It "connects the dots" between data that is not seemingly related. And it supports multi-jurisdictional task forces - enhancing national information sharing, links between regional and state systems, and virtual regional information sharing.</p>
